An Adjourned Meeting of the Board of Directors of Vista Irrigation District was held on Wednesday, April 17, 2024, at the offices of the District, 1391 Engineer Street, Vista, California.

## 1. CALL TO ORDER

President Vásquez called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

## 2. ROLL CALL

Directors present: Miller, Vásquez, Kuchinsky, Sanchez, and MacKenzie.

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## 7. BOARD COMPENSATION

See staff report attached hereto.

President Vásquez opened the public hearing at 9:10 a.m. It was noted that there were no members of the public present in-person or telephonically. General Manager Brett Hodgkiss stated that no public comments were received in writing or by telephone. President Vásquez closed the public hearing at 9:11 a.m.

The Board discussed that the California Water Code allows the governing board of a water district to increase its compensation by five percent for each calendar year following the operative date of the last adjustment. Escalating the current per diem rate of \$200 by five percent for the nine years since its last adjustment, the maximum compensation allowable to the Board at this time would be \$290 per day's service. The proposed increase would take the per diem amount from \$200 to \$210.

Director Miller stated that a nominal increase to the per diem would serve to "reset the clock" and lessen the possibility of a large increase in the future.

Director MacKenzie concurred with Director Miller's statement and commented that the Board's responsibility has increased tremendously over the past nine years and that a \$10 increase to the per diem would not be unreasonable.

Director Kuchinsky commented that he is not in favor of increasing Directors' per diem by \$10; he would prefer the option of requesting a per diem for Directors' involvement in activities that directly serve the community.

President Vásquez commented that the only benefit of increasing Directors' compensation would be to "reset the clock" to lessen the possibility of a large increase in the future; he expressed concern about the impact on District ratepayers and indicated that he was not in favor of increasing the per diem amount.

In response to a question by the Board, General Counsel Elizabeth Mitchell clarified that should the Board vote to increase the Directors' per diem to \$210 each Director can decide whether to take the increase.

Upon motion by Director Sanchez, seconded by Director Miller, the Board of Directors adopted Ordinance No. 2024-01 setting Directors' per diem compensation at \$210 for each day's attendance at meetings of the Board of Directors or for each day's service rendered as a member of the Board of Directors, by the following roll call vote:

## 8. SCHOLARSHIP CONTEST

Ms. Goodrick presented a brief summary of the Public Affairs Committee's discussion in its April 10, 2024 meeting regarding the Scholarship Contest. Public Affairs Committee Chair Sanchez stated that the Committee reviewed the applications and after careful consideration recommended awarding \$2,000 scholarships to Elizabeth Fellars and Juan Paz of Rancho Buena Vista High School and Ilona Medina from Vista High School. Committee Member Kuchinsky commented that he enjoyed reviewing the applications and that all three scholarship recipients submitted well thought out and unique solutions to the essay question. Chair Sanchez stated that Ms. Fellars, Mr. Paz and Ms. Media would be presented a certificate in the amount of the scholarship award at the May 1, 2024 Board meeting and that he and Committee Member Kuchinsky would be attending the upcoming awards presentations for each recipient at their respective high schools.

Henry, Vista Irrigation District's first Board President, to Elizabeth Fellars and Juan Paz from Rancho Buena Vista High School and Ilona Medina from Vista High School.

## 9. MATTERS PERTAINING TO THE ACTIVITIES OF THE SAN DIEGO COUNTY WATER AUTHORITY

Director Miller reported that the next San Diego County Water Authority (Water Authority) Board of Directors meeting would be April 25, 2024. He said that Metropolitan Water District (MWD) had finalized its biennial budget, and the MWD Board adopted rates and charges for Calendar Years 2025 and 2026. The rates and charges will increase by 8.5 percent each calendar year. The MWD Board also approved increasing the Ad Valorem property tax rate from 0.0035 to 0.0070 percent. Director Miller indicated that the Water Authority would begin finalizing its rates and charges for Calendar Year 2025 now that MWD has adopted its rates and charges.

## 10. MEETINGS AND EVENTS

Director MacKenzie reported on her attendance at the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) Legislative Symposium where she heard updates on the implementation of the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act and legislative action related to groundwater management and water conservation in California. She reported on her attendance at a meeting of the ACWA State Legislative Committee where there was discussion on various bills. Director MacKenzie reported on her attendance at a Council of Water Utilities meeting where she heard a presentation on the East County Advanced Water Purification Program and her attendance at a California Special Districts Association (CSDA) San Bernardino Chapter meeting where she heard a presentation from East Valley Water District General Manager/CEO Michael Moore regarding progressive design build.

Director Sanchez mentioned that the Fiscal Policy Committee would be meeting on April 30, 2024.

Director Miller reported on his attendance at a San Luis Rey Indian Water Authority Board of Directors meeting where he gave a presentation on the Colorado River.

Director Kuchinsky reported that he attended a Vista Government Affairs meeting and made a presentation on the Vista Irrigation District. He also heard a presentation from the Clean Energy Alliance (CEA) regarding the transition of energy distribution from San Diego Gas & Electric to CEA in north San Diego County.

President Vásquez requested authorization to attend the Vista Historical Society Hall of Fame Luncheon on May 18, 2024 and informed the Board that he would not be able to attend ACWA Spring Conference May 7-9, 2024 due to medical reasons.

All Directors reported on their attendance at the Ethics Training on April 15, 2024.

Director Kuchinsky suggested adding an item to a future agenda recognizing the 25th Anniversary of the Alta Vista Botanical Gardens.

Mr. Hodgkiss said that the Board would receive a status report from the District's grant writing consultant in June.

## 12. COMMENTS BY DIRECTORS

Director Kuchinsky commended engineering staff on the Edgehill Reservoir Replacement and Pump Station Project and suggested that staff explore avenues for recognition of the project. He noted that Mr. Wolinski and Meter Repair Technician Abraham Gomez received a commendation from a District customer for assisting with a water leak. Director Kuchinsky commented on the ACWA Joint Powers Insurance Authority (JPIA) Annual Review and Risk Assessment Visit letter provided to the Board.

Director Sanchez also commented on the ACWA JPIA Annual Review and Risk Assessment Visit letter congratulating Mr. Wolinski on providing a successful and informative walkthrough.

Director MacKenzie commented on a newspaper article that reported on the ongoing water quality issues at the Warner Springs Unified School District.

President Vásquez noted that he and Director Sanchez were featured in the *Movers & Shakers* section of a recent edition of California Special Districts (a CSDA publication); he also commented on several articles contained in the publication.

## 14. COMMENTS BY GENERAL MANAGER

Mr. Hodgkiss informed the Board that the agenda packet for the April 29, 2024 Financing Capital Projects Workshop would be sent out early next week to allow extra time to review the information. He said that the water level at Lake Henshaw was at 28,500 acre feet at the time of his report.

President Vásquez called for a brief break at 10:30 a.m. prior to going into closed session. The Board returned from break and went immediately into closed session at 10:38 a.m.

SUBJECT: MATERIALS FOR MAINLINE REPLACEMENT

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Approve the purchase of pipeline materials from Pacific Pipeline Supply for mainline replacement on Independence Way (D-2382; DIV NO 3) in the amount of \$248,934.41.

<u>PRIOR BOARD ACTION</u>: On December 6, 2023, the Board approved the purchase of pipeline materials from Ferguson Waterworks totaling \$244,239.62 for this project.

FISCAL IMPACT: \$248,934.41 including tax and freight.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: The District solicited bids from three vendors, Core & Main, Ferguson Waterworks and Pacific Pipeline Supply. All bids were responsive to the District's specifications; Pacific Pipeline Supply submitted the lowest bid.

<u>DETAILED REPORT</u>: This bid represents the remaining balance of material needed to replace 6,100 feet of various sizes of steel, asbestos cement and PVC pipe in Independence Way, Sherman Way, Monte Mar Road, Elm Drive and Dolphin Circle that was installed between the mid-1930s and 1980. Storage limitations at the project's staging area and District headquarters restricted the amount of materials that could be ordered at one time; therefore, two separate material orders were necessary. Staff recommends the replacement of this mainline, as it will eliminate a segment of steel pipe with an elevated leak history that has reached the end of its useful life.

Materials being purchased for this phase project include 4-inch, 8-inch and 12-inch PVC pipe and various fittings.

Bid Results: Pacific Pipeline Supply \$248,934.41

Ferguson Waterworks \$253,652.37

Core & Main \$259,496.95

CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT (CEQA): This purchase is for a mainline replacement project that staff previously determined to be exempt under Class 2 of the State CEQA Guidelines section 15302 (Replacement or Reconstruction), 14 CCR § 15302(c) because it consists of replacement or reconstruction of an existing utility system and/or facilities involving negligible or no expansion of capacity, and there is no potential for the project to cause either a direct or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: Last year, Senator Marie Alvarado-Gil introduced Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 52, which would proclaim the week of May 14, 2023 to May 20, 2023 (coinciding with Special Districts Legislative Days) to be *Special Districts Week*; it encouraged all Californians to be involved in their communities and be civically engaged with their local government. On March 21, 2024, Assembly Member Gregg Hart introduced Assembly Concurrent Resolution (ACR) No. 163, which would proclaim the week of May 19, 2024 to May 25, 2024 (coinciding with Special Districts Legislative Days) to be *Special Districts Week*. Like last year, the legislature is encouraging Californians across the state to engage with their local communities and to be actively involved with their government, particularly with special districts and the areas they serve.

The California Special Districts Association is requesting that special districts support the legislature's efforts by taking various actions, including sending a letter of support for ACR 163 (attached) and adopting a resolution proclaiming the week of May 19, 2024 to May 25, 2024 to be Special Districts Week. Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 163—Relative to Special Districts Week.

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 163, as introduced, Hart. Special Districts Week. This measure proclaims the week of May 19, 2024, to May 25, 2024, to be Special Districts Week.

WHEREAS, Special districts are local governmental entities created by a community's residents, funded by those residents, and overseen by those residents, to provide specialized services and infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, Today, just over 2,000 independent special districts provide millions of Californians with essential services, including services related to water, sanitation, and water recycling, fire protection, electricity, parks and recreation, health care, open space, ports and harbors, flood protection, mosquito abatement, cemeteries, resource conservation, airports, transit, road maintenance, veterans' facilities, and more; and

WHEREAS, Special districts first arose when San Joaquin Valley farmers needed a way to access their local water supply;

WHEREAS, Hospital districts arose in 1945 because of a statewide shortage of hospital beds. In 1994, the Legislature then expanded their breadth and renamed them health care districts in recognition of the diverse, modern needs of California's communities and the importance of proactive, affordable health care beyond the walls of a hospital building; and

WHEREAS, Although originally created to provide individual services, in 1961, the Legislature authorized special districts to address multiple needs when it provided for multipurpose, community services districts; and

WHEREAS, Special districts vary in size and scope and serve diverse communities throughout California, from small rural neighborhoods, such as the Pine Cove Water District in the San Jacinto Mountains in the County of Riverside, to large urban regions, such as the East Bay Municipal Utility District spanning much of the Counties of Alameda and Contra Costa; and

WHEREAS, Local residents own special districts and govern them through locally elected or appointed boards. A series of sunshine laws ensure special districts remain transparent and accountable to the communities they serve, as these laws require open and public meetings, public access to records, regular audits, online posting of finances and compensation, and more; and

WHEREAS, To prevent overlapping services and ensure that local agencies are operating effectively and efficiently to meet community needs, special districts are formed, reviewed,

consolidated, or dissolved through a methodical local process that includes the oversight of a local agency formation commission and the consent of local voters; and

WHEREAS, In 1969, several independent special districts formed a statewide association called the California Special Districts Association, commonly referred to as the CSDA, to promote good governance and improved essential local services through professional development, advocacy, and other services for all types of independent special districts; and

WHEREAS, The Legislature seeks to promote democratic institutions, community-based services, local control, and self-determination; and

WHEREAS, The Legislature seeks to promote and educate the public about their local public service providers, including awareness and understanding of special districts; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring, That the Legislature hereby proclaims the week of May 19, 2024, to May 25, 2024, inclusive, to be Special Districts Week and encourages all Californians to be involved in their communities and be civically engaged with their local government; and be it further

In 1994, the Legislature then expanded their breadth and renamed them health care districts in recognition of the diverse, modern needs of California's communities and the importance of proactive, affordable health care beyond the walls of a hospital building; and

WHEREAS, although originally created to provide individual services, in 1961 the Legislature authorized special districts to address multiple needs, when it provided for multipurpose, community services districts; and

WHEREAS, special districts vary in size and scope and serve diverse communities throughout California, from small rural neighborhoods, such as the Pine Cove Water District in the San Jacinto Mountains of the County of Riverside, to large urban regions, such as the East Bay Municipal Utility District spanning much of the Counties of Alameda and Contra Costa; and

WHEREAS, local residents own special districts and govern them through locally elected or appointed boards. A series of sunshine laws ensure special districts remain transparent and accountable to the communities they serve, as these laws require open and public meetings, public access to records, regular audits, online posting of finances and compensation, and more; and

WHEREAS, to prevent overlapping services and ensure that local agencies are operating effectively and efficiently to meet community needs, special districts are formed, reviewed, consolidated, or dissolved through a methodical local process that includes the oversight of a local agency formation commission and the consent of local voters; and

WHEREAS, in 1969, several independent special districts formed a statewide association called the California Special Districts Association, commonly referred to as the CSDA, to promote good governance and improved essential local services through professional development, advocacy, and other services for all types of independent special districts; and

WHEREAS, Vista Irrigation District seeks to promote democratic institutions, community-based services, local control, and self-determination; and

WHEREAS, Vista Irrigation District seeks to promote and educate the public about their local public service providers, including awareness and understanding of special districts;

NOW, THERFORE, IT BE RESOLVED by the Vista Irrigation District Board of Directors that Vista Irrigation District hereby joins the California State Legislature in proclaiming the week of May 19, 2024, to May 25, 2024, inclusive, to be Special Districts Week and encourages all residents to be involved in their community and be civically engaged with their local government.

**SUBJECT:** BOARD COMPENSATION

## **RECOMMENDATIONS**:

- 1) Conduct a public hearing for the purpose of receiving comments on a revision to the District ordinance setting compensation for the Board of Directors.
- 2) Consider adopting Ordinance No. 2024-01 setting \$210 as Directors' per diem compensation for each day's attendance at meetings of the Board of Directors or for each day's service rendered as a member of the Board of Directors.

<u>PRIOR BOARD ACTION</u>: At its May 13, 2015 meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) adopted Ordinance No. 15-01 setting \$200 as Directors' per diem compensation for each day's attendance at meetings of the Board or for each day's service rendered as a member of the Board. At its March 20, 2024 meeting, the Board approved calling for a public hearing to receive comments on a revision to the District Ordinance setting compensation for the Board of Directors at \$210.

<u>FISCAL IMPACT</u>: Undeterminable due to the Board's discretion; however, at the March 20, 2024 Board meeting, the Board called for a public hearing to consider an increase in the per diem amount from \$200 to \$210 per director, per day's service. If adopted, \$3,050 would be the approximate increase to the average annual Board per diem total expense based on data for three years (excluding Fiscal Years 2020 through 2022 due to the pandemic).

<u>SUMMARY</u>: Pursuant to State Water Code section 20200 et seq. (Water Code), the Board adopted Ordinance No. 15-01 setting its per diem compensation at \$200 per day's service as a director at its May 13, 2015 meeting. Based on direction and discussion from the previous Board meeting, a draft ordinance changing the compensation for Directors from \$200 to \$210 per day's service is attached for the Board's consideration at today's public hearing. In compliance with Government Code 6066, the Notice of Public Hearing was (and will be) duly published in the San Diego Union-Tribune (Union-Tribune) a newspaper of general circulation in the District's service area on April 8, 2024 and April 14, 2024. The affidavit of publication will be included as part of the administrative record and made available to the public upon receipt from the Union-Tribune.

<u>DETAILED REPORT</u>: As per the District's Rules and Regulations, per diem compensation is pre-approved for directors to attend meetings of the Board and standing or ad hoc committees of the Board. Per diem compensation is pre-approved for Directors appointed by the Board President to represent the District at meetings of water industry related organizations including, but not limited to, joint powers boards, San Luis Rey Watershed Council, Groundwater Resources Association of California and legislative water advisory meetings. Per diem compensation is also pre-approved for directors duly elected or appointed to serve on the governing board or committee of another governmental agency or association, to which the District is a member, to attend official meetings of said governing boards or committees, including, but not limited to, the California Special Districts Association (CSDA), Local Agency Formation Commission and Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA).

Prior authorization must be received from the Board in a public meeting in order to receive per diem compensation for attendance at functions that constitute the performance of official duties such as conferences, seminars, training sessions, educational activities or other events sponsored by professional organizations such as ACWA, CSDA and Urban Water Institute. Per diem compensation is not allowed for attendance at events that are primarily meal or social functions. According to the Water Code, no compensation shall be authorized for any Director for more than 10 days of service in any calendar month.

According the Water Code, the governing board of a water district may increase its compensation by five percent for each calendar year following the operative date of the last adjustment. Escalating the current per diem rate of \$200 by five percent for the nine years since its last adjustment, the maximum compensation allowable to the Board at this time would be \$290 per day's service. The Board has previously indicated a desire to consider an increase to \$210 per day's service. If adopted, this Ordinance would become effective 60 days after its adoption.

## ORDINANCE NO. 2024-01

## AN ORDINANCE OF THE VISTA IRRIGATION DISTRICT BOARD OF DIRECTORS ESTABLISHING COMPENSATION FOR DIRECTORS OF THE DISTRICT

WHEREAS, on May 13, 2015, members of the Board of Directors of Vista Irrigation District adopted Ordinance No. 15-01 authorizing Board compensation at a rate of \$200 for each day's service rendered as a member of the Board; and

WHEREAS, California Water Code section 20200 *et seq.* provides that increases in the rate of compensation for directors may be authorized by ordinance, and that such increases shall not exceed an amount equal to five percent for each calendar year following the operative date of the last adjustment; and

WHEREAS, April 17, 2024 at 9:00 a.m. at the District Office was designated as the time and place for hearing on this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, such hearing was held and evidence submitted to the Board of Directors, and the Board having heard and considered all such evidence including public comments and objections, both oral and written as was received.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Directors of the Vista Irrigation District as follows:

- SECTION 1. **Recitals**. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein as findings.
- SECTION 2. **Effective Date**. Upon approval by the Board of Directors, the rate of compensation set forth in this Ordinance will be effective June 16, 2024.
- SECTION 3. **Additional Findings**. The Board of Directors hereby makes the following additional findings:
  - 1. According to California Water Code section 20200 *et seq.*, the governing board of a water agency may increase its compensation by ordinance and that such increases shall not exceed an amount equal to five percent for each calendar year following the operative date of the last adjustment.
  - 2. Escalating the current compensation rate of \$200 by five percent for nine years since the last adjustment, the maximum compensation allowable would be \$290 per day's service.
  - 3. Increasing the compensation rate to \$210.00 per day for each day's attendance at meetings of the Board of Directors and for each day's authorized service to the District rendered as a member of the Board of Directors is permitted pursuant to California Water Code section 20200 et seq.

- 4. No compensation shall be authorized for any Director for more than a total of 10 days of service in any calendar month consistent with California Water Code section 20200 *et seq*.
- SECTION 4. **Notice**. The Notice of Public Hearing was duly published on April 8, 2024 and April 14, 2024 in The San Diego Union-Tribune, a newspaper of general circulation in the District's service area.
- SECTION 5. **Amendment to Rules and Regulations**. Based on the foregoing conclusions and evidence, the Board of Directors of Vista Irrigation District does hereby amend certain provisions of the District's Rules and Regulations as follows:

## 1.5 BOARD OF DIRECTORS

## 1.5.1 Director's Compensation

Each member of the Board of Directors shall receive compensation of \$210 per day (per diem compensation) for each day's attendance at meetings of the Board or for each day's service rendered as a member of the Board by request of the Board, and for each day while reasonably engaged in travel time to attend authorized meetings, up to a maximum of ten (10) days in any calendar month.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Approve the Public Affairs Committee's recommendation to award \$2,000 scholarships in honor of George S. Henry, Vista Irrigation District's first Board President, to Elizabeth Fellars and Juan Paz from Rancho Buena Vista High School and Ilona Medina from Vista High School.

<u>PRIOR BOARD ACTION</u>: On May 3, 2023, the Board awarded \$2,000 scholarships to Naia Riggenbach from Pacific Ridge High School and Riley Robbins from Rancho Buena Vista High School, and \$1,500 scholarships to Monica Lozada from San Marcos High School and Colin Gastauer, Sarai Rojas and Samantha Harris from Vista High School.

FISCAL IMPACT: \$6,000; the Fiscal Year 2024 budget included \$10,000 for the scholarship contest.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: Each year, the District invites high school seniors who live or go to school within its service area to compete for a scholarship. The purpose of the scholarship program is to increase student knowledge and awareness of water related issues affecting the District and its customers. Students who compete for a scholarship must complete an essay and provide a one page personal statement related to their background and/or goals; selection criteria also include community involvement or volunteer service, and letters of recommendation.

<u>DETAILED REPORT</u>: In November 2023, application packets, which included a brochure for the 2024 scholarship contest in honor of George S. Henry, Vista Irrigation District's first Board President in 1923, were provided to counselors of high schools located within the District's jurisdictional boundaries. Follow-up calls and e-mails were made to the counselors to ensure receipt of application materials and inquire as to students' interest in the program; additional scholarship promotional efforts included issuing a news release and promoting the contest on the District's website and San Diego County Water Authority's Water News Network webpage and in the City of Vista's newsletter. Application materials were made available on the District's website. The District received eight applications from high school seniors by the February 23, 2024 deadline.

Committee members Sanchez and Kuchinsky were the judges for the contest. The Committee reviewed the applications and recommended awarding \$2,000 scholarships to Elizabeth Fellars and Juan Paz from Rancho Buena Vista High School and Ilona Medina from Vista High School.

If the Board approves the Committee's recommendation, a certificate in the amount of the scholarship award will be presented to each of the winners at the May 1, 2024 Board meeting. Once the student has enrolled at a university, District staff will forward a check in the awarded amount to each university on behalf of the student(s).
